#### WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MOMENT?




YEAR 7

One hint to encourage your child to read is to tell them about a book that you loved when you were little. This helps reading to feel like a shared experience, rather than a chore.





#### BOOKS WE'RE LOVING THIS WEEK

#### WHAT'S COMING UP?




As part of **Young Poet's Week** (24th November), MCA are having a visit from a professional poet called Lisa O'Hare.
